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The Gustav Neuenschwander Prize

The Gustav Neuenschwander Prize is the principal prize of the ESHS. It is awarded for outstanding lifelong achievements and major contributions to the discipline of the history of science. It was created by Erwin Neuenschwander in 2011 in memory of his father Gustav Neuenschwander. The first Gustav Neuenschwander Prizes were awarded to Claude Debru (Athens, 2012), Jürgen Renn (Lisbon, 2014), Nancy Siraisi (Prague, 2016) and Robert Fox (London, 2018). The fifth prize will be announced and awarded at the 9th International Conference of the ESHS (Bologna, 2020).
